

Welcome to our latest edition of Trust Matters



Dear Foundation Trust Members.

Welcome to the latest edition of Trust Matters, our publication designed to keep you informed of the latest developments across Royal Preston and Chorley and South Ribble Hospitals.

Last September, we welcomed our new Chief Executive, Kevin McGee, to Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. It has been a pleasure to work alongside Kevin since he joined us and I look forward to working with him on many projects, including the New Hospitals Programme in the years ahead. Kevin has just been awarded the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in the New Year's Honours for his many years of service to the NHS, much of which has been within Lancashire and South Cumbria, so I know you will agree that he is an excellent addition to our Trust.

I'd like to place on record my sincere thanks to all staff for their outstanding efforts as we approach the two-year anniversary of the COVID-19 pandemic. Throughout these unprecedented times, they continue to go above and beyond and deal with very challenging circumstances with courage, commitment and compassion, to ensure patients across Lancashire & South Cumbria receive the best possible care.

I'm sure all of our local communities will echo my praise, particularly at a time when COVID-19 remains prevalent in our communities with new variants continuing to be identified globally. The new Omicron virus is proving particularly virulent at the time of writing. This means that we are currently considering a number of contingency plans for potential new space on our site at Preston. This will include a new Nightingale Surge Hub in one of our visitor car parks and you can read more about this on our website.

As a result of rising COVID-19 cases, our hospitals remain exceptionally busy and I cannot emphasise enough the importance of asking all who visit our hospitals, whether you're a patient, carer or loved one, that you comply with the infection prevention and control procedures — this includes the use of face masks on-site together with social distancing (>2 metres) and regular hand hygiene practice — that are still required in the NHS and other health care settings.

We are continuing to review all of our guidelines on a regular basis, particularly around visiting. It's paramount that we continue to keep our patients, staff and visitors safe when visiting our hospitals and it's for that reason the Trust has taken the difficult decision to restrict adult inpatient visiting until further notice. Due to the changing nature of COVID-19, this is a fluid situation and some exceptions do apply, such as for children, maternity, end-of-life and carer support with full guidance is available on our Trust website. I appreciate this decision will have an impact on patients and families and we will continue to offer alternatives - such as FaceTime - to allow you to communicate with your loved ones..

Thank you for your continued support of your local NHS and taking the time to read all about what's happening at our hospitals.

Please continue to follow Government guidance to help keep yourself and your loved ones safe — and most of all please encourage everyone you know to have their COVID-19 booster jab.

Latest news from the New Hospitals Programme

The Lancashire and South Cumbria New Hospitals Programme offers a once in-a-generation opportunity to transform our region's ageing hospitals and develop new, cutting-edge hospital facilities that offer the absolute best in modern healthcare.

Following the publication of our Case for Change report in July 2021 (https://newhospitals.info/CaseForChange), the Lancashire and South Cumbria New Hospitals Programme has now entered an important phase. Over the last few months, we have been busy collecting information on everything from what future clinical and technological developments we might need to accommodate in new hospital facilities, to potential land availability and building specifications. We have also involved thousands of patients, staff and stakeholders in conversations to start to build a picture of what they do (and don't!) want from new hospital facilities.

In September 2021, we published a longlist of possible solutions to address some or all of the main challenges facing Royal Preston Hospital and Royal Lancaster Infirmary, with investment in Furness General Hospital. As established through the Case for Change process, these three hospitals are the priority for investment. The longlist of proposals includes rebuilding on the existing hospital sites, rebuilding somewhere new and / or refurbishing existing buildings and facilities — and various combinations of all these variables.

We asked for feedback on the longlist of proposals from staff and Foundation Trust Members using our Big Chat online discussion, with 1,895 people joining this conversation. Members of the public also had a chance to have their say in person at our New Hospitals Programme roadshows with Healthwatch Together, as well our survey, which received nearly 3,500 responses from people across

the region. We have also been running a range of workshops and hearing directly from people who will be most impacted by new hospital facilities, as well as keeping MPs and local authority leaders up-to-date with the progress of the programme. Thank you to everyone who has taken the time to share their feedback to date!

What's next?

We now need to start narrowing down the possible scenarios for what we might do.

Step One: Agree the problems we need to solve ✓

Step Two: Create a draft longlist of possible solutions to those problems ✓

Step Three: Work with experts and stakeholders to refine and agree this longlist ✓

Step Four: Gather feedback on the longlist of proposals from NHS staff, patients and local people ✓

Now these steps are complete, we will use all the feedback we've received to help us narrow down the proposals to a shortlist. We anticipate this will conclude in Spring 2022.

Chief Executive awarded OBE in New Year Honours



We are delighted to confirm that our Chief Executive, Kevin McGee, has been named in this year's New Year Honours list.

A familiar and well respected figure both within the Lancashire health and care system, and the wider North West region, Kevin was until September 2021 the joint CEO of East Lancashire Hospitals NHS Trust and Blackpool Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, and has received the Order of the British Empire (OBE) for his services to the NHS. Speaking about his OBE, Kevin McGee said it was a 'huge honour' following a varied and extensive career within the health care system: "It's a huge honour to have received the Order of the British Empire and to be named alongside so many inspiring individuals, many of whom work for the NHS.

"I'm very privileged to have had a varied and extensive career within the health care system, but the biggest reward is being able to work with so many amazing staff and partners who are dedicated to ensuring that we provide the very best health care services for the local populations of Lancashire and South Cumbria particularly during this pandemic."

One year since our first COVID-19 vaccine was administered

It has been just over a year since our Trust became one of the first hospitals in the country to administer the COVID-19 vaccine.

We gave our first vaccine to 81-year-old Doreen McKeown on 8th December 2020, making her one of the first people in the world to be vaccinated against COVID-19.

Doreen is one of our volunteers and we were delighted to give something back to someone who gives us so much.

Doreen, who is now 82, and lives in Hutton, spoke to the Lancashire Post twelve months on and says it was a "pure coincidence" that she ended up being one of the first people in Lancashire to be



vaccinated having opted for an early appointment to avoid traffic.

Speaking to Paul Faulkner, Doreen said: "It's been a rollercoaster year for the whole world. I'm so proud of the NHS in Lancashire and Lancashire Teaching Hospitals — they have done a tremendous job, as have the people who developed the vaccine."

Asked what her advice would be to those hesitating to get the vaccine, Doreen added: "My advice to people would be: do not hesitate, don't be afraid – get out there and get it, for your own sake, but for everybody else, too."

The first antiviral drug to treat patients with COVID-19 and trialled at LTH was approved by UK medicines regulator

The first oral antiviral drug designed to treat patients with COVID-19 and trialled at Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust was approved by the UK medicines regulator last November.

The Lancashire Clinical Research Facility, who are a partnership of the Trust were one of seven centres across the UK recruiting volunteers for the AGILE coronavirus drug testing initiative.

In October 2021, television cameras gained access to Royal Preston Hospital as the Trust became one of the first hospitals to administer the antiviral drug to patients with early onset COVID-19, but who had not been hospitalised, as part of the research trial.

Speaking to ITV News, Dr Hadjiyiannakis, medical director for the Lancashire Clinical Research Facility, said: "It causes the virus to over mutate, cause more mutations in its genetic material and therefore kill itself."

Dementia Resource Corridor

In September 2021, the Dementia Resource Corridor opened at Royal Preston Hospital.

The aim of the corridor is to promote dementia awareness and features a range of resources for those affected by dementia to learn about the disease and strategies to enable people to live well. The corridor also features some cognitive stimulation activities and signposting information on local and national services.

Christmas lights switch on



For the first time in two years, Royal Preston Hospital was able to get into the festive spirit with a small-scale Christmas lights switch-on.

Due to COVID-19 regulations which still apply to all NHS and social care settings, Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust has not been able to hold festive events for two years.

An Order of Service was led by Lead Chaplain, Martin McDonald, and there were Christmas carols from the Trust's staff-led Choir who, in recent times, have only been able to get together online; before 14-year-old Selina, an inpatient, did the honours of switching-on the lights.

A small service was also held at Chorley & South Ribble Hospital; a tradition which dates back to 2005 but has not been possible since 2019.

The UK's first asthma bus launched in Leyland

The UK's first 'asthma bus' spent 10 weeks in Lancashire in 2021 to provide vital resources to pressured NHS respiratory services.

The PRECISION Asthma Mobile Clinic officially opened on 6th October 2021, at Chorley House, based on Lancashire Enterprise Business Park in Leyland before moving to Healthport in Preston.

The partnership has helped to accelerate the delivery of asthma care appointments in the region. This comes after more than 1 in 20 (6.7%) asthma sufferers delayed emergency care during the pandemic and over a quarter (27.5%) avoided receiving treatment from their GP.





New garden opens in Critical Care Unit at Royal Preston Hospital

A brand new garden area outside Royal Preston Hospital's Critical Care unit is now helping staff to relax and recuperate amid busy shifts in intensive care. The purpose built garden provides staff members, working on ICU, with an area to visit during or after their shifts to chat, and unwind from what can be a stressful and emotional environment.

This project helps compliment what has been a significant transformation of the unit with phase four of the expansion and refurbishment being completed in March 2021 which now provides first-class facilities to patients across Lancashire & South Cumbria.

Refurbished Oncology ward opens at Royal Preston Hospital

In October 2021, we opened Rosemere Cancer Centre's new 24-bed Ribblesdale Ward at Royal Preston Hospital.

The Ribblesdale Ward is the only inpatient oncology-specific ward in Lancashire & South Cumbria and supports patients with a wide range of clinical needs and end-of-life care.

The ward was transformed after receiving funding of over £1m from the Rosemere Cancer Foundation following its hugely successful 20th-anniversary appeal.

The state-of-the-art ward consists of shared and single bedroom spaces for patients being cared for by a specialist cancer team, with additional areas for relatives to visit their loved ones. Nature-inspired interiors will promote a healthy recovery and positive wellbeing through bespoke wood designs that feature back-lit art panels, floor vectors, and skylights that can be tailored to the time of day.

A patient's loved ones also have access to a relatives room which

includes homely furnishings such as sofas, a tv unit, bean bags, loose storage, and digital wall prints; as well as a modern kitchen space.

Dan Hill, chief officer of Rosemere Cancer Foundation, said: "We are incredibly proud of our supporters for helping us make the Ribblesdale Ward unrecognisable from how it was just a few short months ago. The upgrade is quite stunning."

Hundreds of patients are treated on Ribblesdale Ward every year and are looked after by a dedicated team of matron, 24 consultants, 15 nurses, 20 healthcare assistants, a ward clerk, two housekeepers and a domestics crew.

The Rosemere Cancer Foundation funds cutting-edge equipment, clinical research, staff training and innovative services and initiatives that the NHS cannot afford in order to make patients' cancer journey more effective, comfortable and stress-free.

Lancashire Eye Centre officially opens

Following a multi-million pound investment, we were delighted to officially open our new Ophthalmology development at Chorley & South Ribble Hospital in December 2021.

The Lancashire Teaching Hospitals' site, known as the Lancashire Eye Centre, is a new and modern purpose built facility which will provide increased capacity to patients across local communities.

The three-tier building includes a dedicated outpatient and diagnostic space as well as three additional theatres to provide extra capacity for patients requiring a variety of day case procedures.

The new unit has been designed with the patient experience at the forefront. The various segments of the building are even colour-coded to ease patient navigation and improve accessibility for those who need additional support.

The Centre will provide urgent and emergency clinics, cataract services and all other specialist ophthalmic services including glaucoma, retina, paediatric, neuro-ophthalmic, oculoplastic and cornea.

It is estimated that the new facility, which is in addition to current facilities at Royal Preston Hospital, will significantly increase the service's capacity and help tackle the backlog of patients currently waiting to be seen. Traditionally ophthalmology departments deal with a high volume of patients with our Trust employing over 90 staff, including 13 consultants.





New Theatres open at Chorley & South Ribble Hospital

In November 2021, we opened three new day case theatres at Chorley and South Ribble Hospital. The new theatres, which now make nine in total, are a much welcomed addition to the site and will help make inroads for patients who are currently awaiting elective procedures.

The multi-million pound project, developed by construction company Tilbury Douglas, has already started to welcome its first patients, with many more scheduled for treatment over the coming months. The theatres will treat patients from across Lancashire and South

Cumbria for a range of surgical specialty day case procedures such as

Orthopaedic, Plastic Surgery and General Surgery.

Steve Canty, Divisional Medical Director for Surgery at Lancashire Teaching Hospitals, added: "The new theatres are a much welcomed and important addition to patients across Lancashire and South Cumbria who are waiting to undergo elective procedures.

"Many have waited for a very long time to receive treatment and these new facilities will help us to treat patients more quickly, and ensure our patients receive the excellent care they require."

Refurbishment of MacMillan Information centres

Macmillan's Cancer Information and Support Service in Lancashire has undergone a £48k refurbishment to help enhance the experience for people living with cancer.

All three sites across our Trust have been given a fresh makeover, while the main hub based at Royal Preston's Rosemere Cancer Centre has added a new quiet room.

The Macmillan Centre, which launched in 2013, has helped more than 17,000 people affected by cancer over the years providing essential practical, emotional and financial support.

New renal services open in Burnley

Our Trust has reached the next milestone in improvements to renal services across Lancashire and South Cumbria with the opening of a new facility in Burnley.

The centre, which will treat patients for kidney disease, opened in October 2021 in Briercliffe Shopping Centre, offering haemodialysis treatment and clinic appointments as part of a seven-year contract.

In September, a similar centre opened in Ulverston to bring outpatient clinic facilities closer to home for patients in the Furness area.

What our Governors do?

There are 28 governors who help to make Lancashire Teaching Hospitals a successful NHS Foundation Trust by ensuring we meet the needs and expectations of our patients.

At the moment our Council of Governors is made up of 6 appointed governors, 18 public governors and 4 staff governors. Both public and staff governors are elected by our constituents.

Together Council represents the interests of our members and partner organisations and provides advice and support to the Board of Directors, which is responsible for the overall management of the Trust. An election to the Council of Governors is to be held in March 2022 and you can read more about the process on page 11.

Despite it being difficult to meet in 2021, Council, like the Board, used Microsoft Teams – fulfilling the obligation to meet four times per year. Governors also used MS Teams to facilitate the

bimonthly meetings of our Care and Safety Subgroup (CaSS) and our Membership Subgroup which meets quarterly.

Our Annual Members' Meeting was also held via MS Teams as were our coffee catch up meetings.

In addition, virtually, some governors attended a national conference organised by NHS Providers; the Trust's staff ambassador group meetings; the launch of our Equality, Diversity Inclusion Strategy 2021-2024; the Safeguarding Champions training; the New Hospital Programme's engagement meetings; the Always Safety First meeting with input from Professor Suzette Woodward and a focus group meeting to consider our new Patient Experience and Involvement Strategy.

There have also been opportunities to visit our hospital sites for a number of events to celebrate the continuing hard work of our wonderful staff which included the opening of the dementia corridor at Royal Preston Hospital; the Lancashire Eye Centre and the new theatres at Chorley and South Ribble Hospital. Last, but not least, Governors had the very difficult decision to short list staff candidates for the coveted Governors' Award in the annual Our People Awards which was awarded to the Hotel Services team.

- Feedback your views to the relevant staff, Chief Executive and Trust Board
- Help the organisation learn from feedback and concerns to improve your experience



We have several patient forums where our patients, carers and communities advise what we need to do to improve their experiences. This valuable feedback is used in many ways, sometimes to change small details but sometimes to pull together huge projects to completely change how we work. One of our forums that is building on this is our Carers Forum, which meets monthly to discuss many different aspects of the hospital and community services.

Currently we are in the early stages of looking at our discharges and how we can assist Carers to make the experience a smoother and an easier transition from hospital back into the community or home.

Accessible Information and work within our communities

One of our important aims and continuing work streams is to ensure we provide information in various formats.

We provide Patient Information now in various languages, font and in audio and we are also creating more videos that include British Sign Language and documents that are easy to read to help ensure our information reaches all of our communities.

We have been working with Deafblind UK and NCompass Deaf support link workers to ensure our staff feel confident in providing support to our communities.

We have also been working with external organisations and charities to produce a registered assistance dog policy so patients

can be confident that we minimise the restrictions of access to registered assistance dogs while reducing any potential distress to owners around separation.

Our policy seeks to provide assurance that all people who need access with registered assistance dogs are welcomed to the Trust and that staff have a clear understanding of the requirements for such dogs entering the premises and the areas where they are allowed, while keeping to our high standards of infection, prevention and control.

The gaming carts, which have been designed especially for healthcare environments such as hospitals, will play a core role in not only helping manage pain, boredom, anxiety and sadness, but studies have shown that gaming can also lead to shorter hospital stays.
